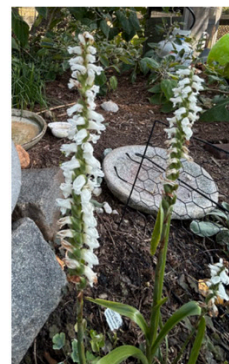

Judges Choice: *Brassavola tuberculata* 'Khairul Bariah' HCC/AOS

Some years ago, I decided to grow a *Brassavola* species into a real specimen plant. I selected *Brassavola tuberculata* (at the time known as *B. perrinii*) as it can carry more and better shaped flowers than most other species in the genus. So, in 2015 I went ahead and bought a plant from Peter T Lin in California. Once the plant arrived I mounted it directly on a piece of cork bark but, because I wanted to grow it straight into specimen size, I attached the bark piece with the small plant to a wood slat mount that I could hang horizontally. It has been growing on that mount ever since. I water every day from May 'til October and every two or three days the rest of the year. I keep it outdoors when the temperature allows, otherwise under lights in our basement. It needs a lot of light. Direct sun for a couple of hours in summer is fine. I fertilize throughout the year but at half strength in winter. My plant of *Brassavola tuberculata* 'Khairul-Bariah' was awarded in 2022 with CCM for culture and HCC for flower quality.

The Orchid Tree of Life Project, led by the Royal Botanic Gardens, Kew, in collaboration with 14 global institutions, aims to unravel the origins and evolution of the orchid family by exploring the evolutionary relationships of all orchid genera (~720) through DNA sequencing. 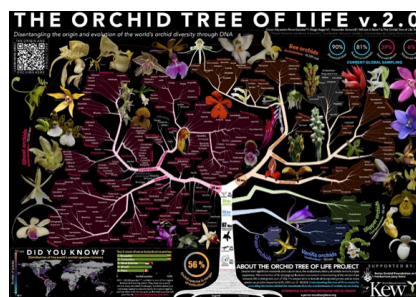

Clark's Corner

Growing Orchids from Flasks

Among horticultural plants, orchids are unique in that their seeds have NO seed food. In nature, they depend on dropping on a perfect location by luck, a process with very, very low yield. Fortunately, we know how to grow the seed by placing them on a perfect nutrient media in a laboratory with sometimes near 100% yield. Because the media is also perfect for fungi and bacteria, in the lab, seeds are surface sterilized and sown under sterile conditions. If you buy a flask of orchid seedlings, they will likely be in a sealed bottle.

Why start with flasks? First, they are very cheap compared to established seedlings. Second, you will get natural variation, including — possibly — superior variations. Third, you get the knowledge of watching the little seedlings mature to blooming size.

You will get lots of different advices on growing from flasks. I give what has worked for me for about 50 years:

1) Carefully remove the plants from the media, typically a jelly-like agar. I do NOT rinse them off and I do NOT apply fungicides. Some people do, but my goal is to ease their transition to pot culture.

2) I like to make “community pots” with up to 9 seedlings per pot. This allows for larger pots with more even conditions.

3) Be sure the plants don’t dry out, but don’t give too much water or they will rot. It helps to use a finer bark while the plants are young. Watchfulness is critical.

4) A little lower light during the first year will help avoid drying out or sunburning.

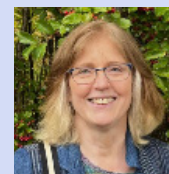

is a blast. I am an accredited judge with the American Orchid Society and have served in various capacities with various orchid societies in California and on the East Coast. I love meeting other people who like orchids too, and doing so often finds me traveling to shows, vendors, and peoples' greenhouses to see the latest and greatest in new hybrids and to get the best orchid gossip. I like to be involved in plants as much as possible: in addition to Longwood, I've worked at the Smithsonian Institution tending to their orchids, and for years for the United States National Arboretum, collecting rare plants and documenting cultivated species and hybrids for their herbarium. In short, I really like plants.

For your meeting, I'll be sharing a presentation on Encyclias of Mexico and Beyond. These spectacular Cattleya relatives are lovely, and with their compact habit, great fragrance, and ease of growth, these are delightful plants for every collection. By extending the traditional definition of Encyclias to include recently separated groups like Anacheilum, Panarica, Prosthechea, Euchile, and others that I and many of you grew up calling Encyclia, we end up with a diverse, beautiful, fragrant, exciting group of plants and flowers; if we add those to the wonderful flora of Mexico and Central America, we have a group that every collector should grow. By the end of this presentation, you will have a new appreciation of the range of plant habits, floral forms, and fragrances of Encyclia broadly, as well as an appreciation of their lovely flowers and ease-of-growth. I will be providing some great Encyclia species and hybrids for sale.
